## Meet Your Neighbor

Mary Pecore has lived at 934 So. Clay Street since her birth in 1915. Martin and Bridgette Gittens, her parents, bought the home with no electricity, furnace or bathroom in 1914. It was illuminated by kerosene lamps and heated by two small wood stoves. Mary wed Joe Pecore in 1950; by 1952 the couple began remodeling the home.

Living across from Astor Park, Mary's fondest memory from childhood is playing crack the whip on a crowded ice rink. She was usually skating backwards at the end of the whip! These days Mary is unable to get out and skate with the neighbors, but she loves to play Schafskopf (Sheepshead) with her friends at St. Francis Xavier Cathedral. She always valued the neighborhood because everyone knew each other and felt safe walking after dark. Mary hopes that the neighborhood continues to be a unique place to raise a family for generations to come.



## House Kudos

It seems that the prairie style house at 709 So. Quincy Street has been under constant construction or renovation since

moved into the four-bedroom home. Most noticeable about the construction is the addition at the back of the house. The garage was removed and rebuilt with a second story that connects to the couple's master bedroom. The new second-floor space serves as Sonya's studio for interior decorating, and can be accessed from the garage as well. A mudroom separates the garage from the house at ground level.

Mike owns a flooring company so it is a given that the wood floors have either been

refinished (second floor) or replaced (first floor). Currently, the kitchen is gutted. An enclosed first floor laundry will take up some of the current kitchen space near the back door; the new kitchen will flow better with the dining room in the style of a galley.

A half-bath is located on the first floor between the foyer and the kitchen. The upstairs has two full baths with the original tile on the walls.

A living room (with gas fireplace) and library/sitting room round out the first floor. A second gas fireplace is in the basement. Frank Lloyd Wright style leaded glass makes-up the front door sidelight and door window, which is uniquely round, and was special-made for the Coppo's.

All of the light fixtures have been or will be replaced; all of the rooms in the house have been or will be painted; the main staircase has the carpet removed and the wood has been stripped.

On the outside, the house has new stucco that has been sealed and painted, new gutters, extensive landscaping, new faux brick concrete front steps and driveway, a new brick walkway in front, a fountain in front, a finished front door, and a new roof on the house.

As for future projects, a smaller, decorative wrought iron shaker porch will replace the one that was removed on the second floor over the driveway. Mike and Sonya desire to add a sauna in the basement, to fix-up the recreation room, and to add some exercise equipment to the soon-to-be-vacated laundry area.

We applaud Mike and Sonya's efforts to maintain the 40's era look and feel of the house.
