


**8TH ANNUAL

*Identity theft is the fastest growing crime in America, affecting tens of millions of people each year.*

Identity theft occurs when someone steals a piece of your personal data—your Social Security number or credit card number—and uses it to impersonate you for financial gain, generally spending as much as possible, as quickly as possible. To make matters worse, victims of identity theft can spend months or even years, along with a substantial amount of money, restoring their credit record. On average, a victim of identity theft spends over 175 hours and about \$880 to clear his/her name.

### TIPS FOR PREVENTING IDENTITY THEFT

- Don't share your Social Security number with people who don't need it.
- Shred documents that contain personal information.
- Review your credit report yearly for fraudulent activity.
- Don't carry unnecessary documents in your wallet or purse.
- Keep track of your accounts online to identify suspicious activity immediately.
