

Opcorn in the Park Helpers Needed

**There's been lots of activity** at 628 S. Monroe just south of the Mason street overpass, another example of improvements that add character to our great neighborhood.

JTP Development LLC recently announced its conversion of the 7-unit apartment building into condominium units. The group, a partnership between Justus Hedeen and Tim and Peggy Besaw, has been rehabbing the nearcentury-old Astor property since purchasing it in May of last year. The condo complex will go by the name The Argyle at Astor, borrowing from the original name of the property: The Argyle Apartments. The 2 bedroom / 1 bath, 1200+ SF condos will start at \$144,900.

Hedeen, who said the historic "flats" reminded him of the popular brownstone apartments seen all over Chicago, believes The Argyle to be one of the oldest multi-family



The emerald ash borer is an exotic insect native to Asia, currently killing ash trees in the Great Lakes region at an alarming

rate. Since its initial discovery in southeastern Michigan in 2002, an estimated 25 million ash trees have been killed by emerald ash borer in these infested areas.

Emerald Ash Borer is Spreading. Despite state and federal quarantines and regulations on the movement of ash firewood, nursery stock and unprocessed logs, the distribution of emerald ash borer is ever increasing. There is a strong possibility that the emerald ash borer is already residing in Wisconsin despite the fact that it has not been found.

Your Help is Needed. Wisconsin's forests include approximately 727 million ash trees. The potential destruction to Wisconsin is unfathomable. Early detection and isolation are our best defenses against the ecological and economic damage. The development of management plans are currently underway by the State of Wisconsin. But your help is still needed looking for emerald ash borer due to the elusive behavior of this pest!

**Visual symptoms** are nearly identical to those we often see on ash infested or infected by other pests and diseases commonly found here. Therefore, it is important to look for at least 2 or more symptoms or signs when trying

properties in Green Bay. Each unit has beautiful original Maple flooring, as well as antique wood trim and crown molding throughout. Adding to its historic charm are built-in linen cabinets and claw-foot tubs.

The renovation to the exterior included repair and painting of the stucco, updating of the windows and frames, and reconstruction of the rear garages. The old driveway and parking lot have also been removed, and will be resurfaced in the coming months. The interiors have been beautifully rehabbed, including complete makeovers of the bathroom and kitchen, and the addition of central heat, A/C and in-unit washers & dryers.

The City of Green Bay Historic Preservation Commission awarded JTP Development LLC with a Historic Preservation Award on May 15th for the rehabilitation of The Arayle property.

to determine the presence of emerald ash borer. The following are common:

**Dieback of the upper and outer crown.** Dead branches throughout the canopy, beginning at the top. Foliage at the top is thin and discolored.

**Epicormic sprouting** at the base and/or on main stem of tree. Trees may sucker excessively both at the base and on the trunk, often just below where the larvae are feeding.

**Vertical bark splits** are caused due to callus tissue that develops around larval galleries. Larval galleries can often be seen beneath splits.

**Woodpeckers feed on larvae** under the bark. Feeding is typically higher in the tree where the emerald ash borer prefers to initially infest.

As adults emerge from under the bark they create **an emergence hole**—1/8 inch in diameter and D-shaped.

As larvae feed under the bark they wind back and forth, thus creating **galleries** that are packed with frass and sawdust and follow a serpentine pattern.

Larvae are cream-colored, dorso-ventrally flattened and have pincher-like appendages at the end of their abdomen. Mature larvae reach 1½ inches in length and are found feeding beneath the bark.

**Adult beetles** are metallic green and % - ½ inch in length and ½ inch in width. Adults are dorsally flattened and ventrally rounded.


